Melita Grant is a Research Director at the Institute for Sustainable Futures — UTS, specialising in water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) in international development, with a focus on gender equality and inclusion.

She has expertise in a range of sustainable development issues, focusing on civil society engagement, multilateral commitments (e.g. the Sustainable Development Goals), inclusivity and climate change challenges in the Asia-Pacific region.

Recently, Melita completed projects such as working with Indian government stakeholders to develop a River Basin Planning Guide; a rural piped water research project in Cambodia and Viet Nam; and a gender equality and inclusion evaluation project in Timor-Leste. She is currently leading multi-year water resources management research projects in the region; including a food security, water management and gender inclusion nexus project in Myanmar. Melita loves co-designing, implementing and evaluating stakeholder and community engagement initiatives with her partners in the Asia-Pacific, and values the deep friendships that have come about from these projects.

As a recipient of the Dunlop Fellowship, Melita intends to explore ethical research partnerships in the Asia-Pacific region, and gender equality and inclusion synergies in development programs.
